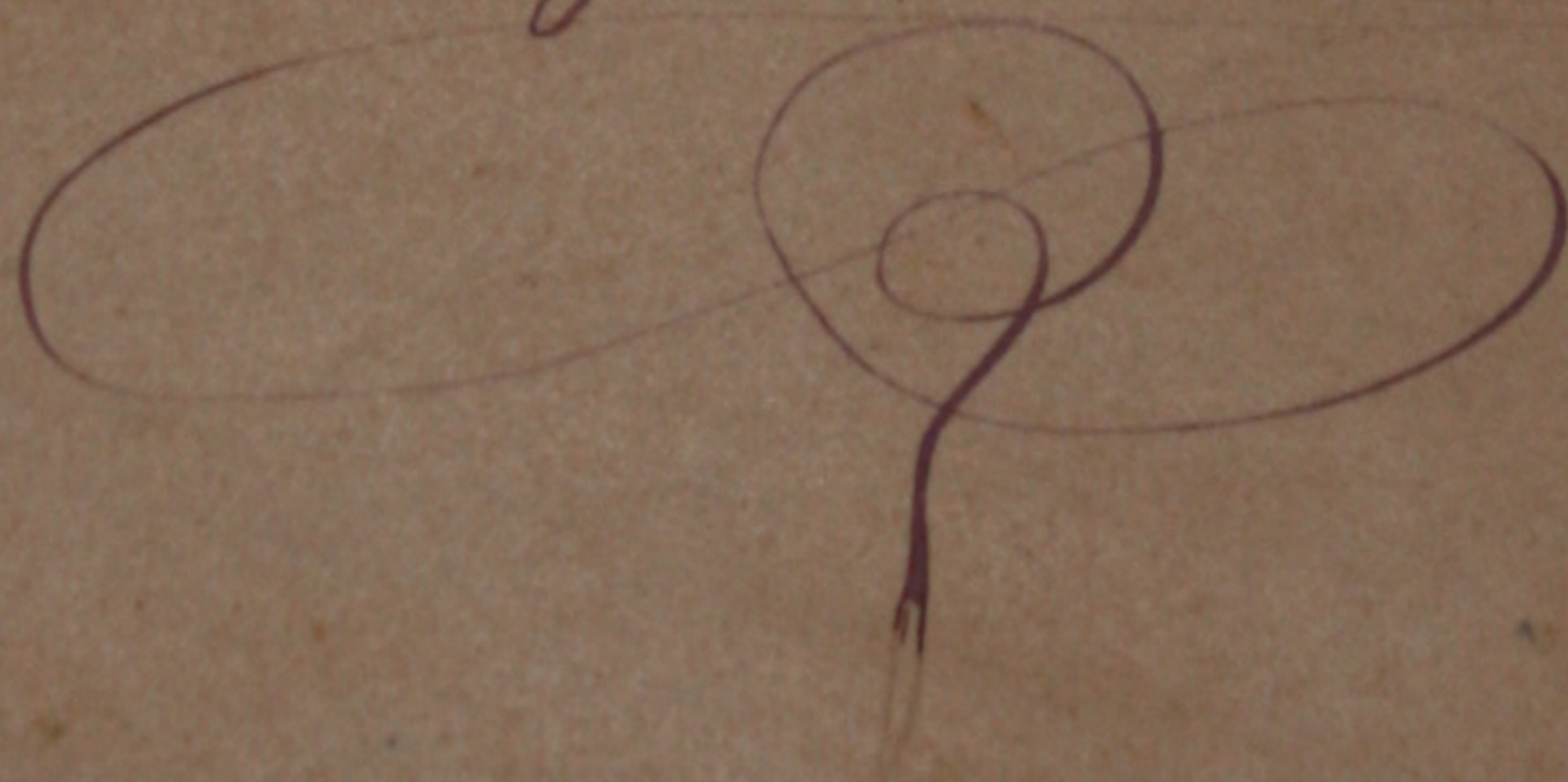



**Valley Youth Killed  
In Corregidor Assault**

Fort Plain — Mr. and Mrs. Charles L. Fox, of High St., Fort Plain, have received word from the War Department that their son, Pfc. Charles L. Fox Jr., was killed in action during the fight to overcome the Japs on Corregidor Island, Manila Bay. The wire read as follows:

"The Secretary of War desires me to express his deep regret that your son Private First Class Charles L. Fox Jr., was killed in action 22 February on Corregidor. Confirming letter follows. J. A. Ulie, Adjutant General."

Pfc. Fox was born in Fort Plain Apr. 30, 1920. He attended the grade and high school of Fort Plain. After leaving school he worked with his father as a painter for a time. Later he was an employe of the Beech-Nut Packing Company, Canajoharie, before his induction in the Army on Feb. 7, 1942. In October, 1942, he left for the Pacific war theater, in the 503rd Paratrooper Infantry. He took part in several of the campaigns in the Southwest Pacific.

The last letter his parents received from him was from the Island of Mindoro, where he had taken part in the invasion. Evidently later he was transferred to the Island of Luzon, where he met his death.

High Mass will be held at St. James Church, Fort Plain, of which he was a member, Saturday morning at 10 o'clock.
